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"Pentecost, Promotions, and Beyond"

Last year I planted a couple grape vines, and now they are showing off their brilliant new foliage. It reminds me of my youth when I helped care for my father's vineyard. Every season of the year was marked by some transition in the life of the vines. In late summer the vines gave up their sweet fruit to the grape pickers (in our case, family and friends). In fall, the leaves turned color and began dropping. Then, in the dormancy of winter we pruned the vines and tied back new canes. Then, magically new buds emerged from the seemingly dead branches in spring and then burst forth with radiant green in early summer.



I love June's many transitions. In June we mark the summer solstice, the longest day of the year and the beginning of summer. Graduations are taking place. Our young people and

world. Couples often use June to start new married life, and some families are taking vacations to renew old relationships. Several in our church family are facing difficult transitions of sickness and end of life. Let us keep them in prayer.

Here in California we're looking at some political transitions as we head to the polls on June 5. Who will be our next governor or U.S. Senator? For Methodist pastors June is when new appointments are confirmed (no announcements for me). For those of us who follow the liturgical calendar, we have transitioned into what is sometimes called "Ordinary" time and the Sundays after Pentecost. It may seem like we're heading into a down-time liturgically after the more intensive periods around Christmas and Easter. The choir will continue one more month before taking a deserved summer break. But there is still plenty going on.

Our Church Council meets this Sunday (June 3) to "look around" at our diverse neighborhoods to evaluate and begin planning ministry for next year. We are getting ready for our "Heroes

That will take place September 16.

Our Annual Conference takes place June 13-16, with the theme "Thirst No More," as an invitation for churches to become more disciple-making. There will likely be a lot of talk about the 2019 special General Conference which will decide the future of our denomination based on recommendations of the Council of Bishops and the Commission on A Way Forward. Will we stay the same, split or find a new unity around the gospel of Jesus Christ? All of this reflects how we relate as a church and denomination to the transitions our society is going through. I can still hear Bob Dylan's 1960s refrain, "For the times they are a-changin."

To go along with this sense of transition, my June sermon series will be, "Transitions." I will reflect on leadership changes in ancient Israel and consider implications for our modern transitions.

Samuel became a new kind of priesthood and prophet because he was attentive to the divine voice. But when he anointed Saul to be king, he was soon disappointed because Saul failed to heed that voice in his own blind spots. Samuel learned to see as God sees when he anointed David as king of Israel. Finally, David himself found courage in the face of daunting opposition by heeding God's voice, and he overcame

Whatever our transitions may be, let us go forward trusting in the one who says, "Remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

In 1980 I worked in **Nirmal Hriday**, Mother Teresa's **Home for the Dying** in Kalighat, Calcutta (Kolkata). Ellen volunteered there for two weeks. When she returned home in the late afternoons, I kept my distance from her. After all it was the **Home for the Dying**, people dying of scary diseases. Only after she had a shower and changed her clothes did I relax. Later I escaped from Bishops College, the main seminary of the Church of North India in Calcutta. I was there as Visiting Professor. I took only 2 days away from my classes to work in the Home for the Dying.

On September 4, 2016, Mother Teresa was declared a Saint by Pope Francis. What is a Saint? Mother Teresa writes that she hates dirty hands and stinky feet. Dirty hands are dirty. Stinky feet

are a Saint, if your eyes are opened to see Jesus among the poor, the abused, and the dying.

In later years he studied with other prominent flamenco masters. He was one of the first flamenco dance teachers in Santa Barbara. He still performs during Old Spanish Days' La Fiesta Pequeña at the Santa Barbara Mission. In motion pictures and television, he has performed with many of Hollywood's leading stars, such as Shirley MacLaine, Michael Caine, Edward James Olmos, John Wayne, Andy Garcia, Bob Hope and many others. He also appeared in the daytime TV drama, General Hospital. To expand his knowledge of flamenco, he has participated in workshops offered in California by Spanish artists in residence. To further his studies of flamenco, Talavera travels to Spain to attend the annual Jerez Flamenco Festival, where he studies with Manolete, Angelita Gomez, Ana María Gonzales, Javier La Torre and Javier Barón. In Sevilla, a major center of flamenco, Talavera continues to meet and study with some of the most

SHELLY BITNER'S RECITAL

What a treat it was to attend the graduate recital of our own administrative assistant, Shelly Bitner. Shelly has been working towards a Master of Music degree in Vocal Performance at Azusa Pacific University. This recital was the culmination of all her hard work.

Being able to perform opera and art song requires extensive training in classical singing technique to maximize vocal power, range and resonance. This is important as classical singers perform without the use of microphones. In addition, operatic repertoire is mainly performed in other languages; so one must be able to master foreign language diction. Throw in the ability to act and bring expression into a role and one can see the skill involved in singing opera well.

Shelly did all this with much aplomb. Taking the stage in a beautiful, blue flowing dress, she was poised and confident. With her equally-accomplished pianist,

songs by de Falla, Shelly seamlessly switched between the four languages with such authenticity that one could imagine her being fluent in all of these.

Shelly's full mezzo-soprano range was utilized to bring out the unique mood of each piece. Her powerful high notes brought out the impassioned confession of Ariodante in Handel's Aria from *Ariodante*; her lush lower range mesmerized in the contemplative lullaby of Brahms. Facial expressions such as a sly little smile at the end of the humorous "El Paño Moruno" or a hand beckoning to the heavens added just the right amount of drama and expression to the pieces.

The final pieces were selections from American composer Gwyneth Walker. Walker had composed a piece for the Wausau Lyric Choir of which Shelly was a member. After hearing Shelly sing, Walker gave her a gift of her music, "Collected Songs," and specifically requested that Shelly sing these. These beautiful solo selections are based on poems. The piece "Crossing the Bar" was especially poignant; Shelly's eloquent interpretation and shaping of the musical phrases brought tears to this author's eyes. (Yes, we all hope to see our Pilot face to face).

Shelly has been blessed with an amazing voice. She is grateful to God and wants to share her gift of music with others. Her next goals
