"Rising With Jesus"

A pair of religious workers knocked on the parsonage door on my day off. I tried to engage them in civil conversation, but it quickly deteriorated with their aggressive mannerism, especially when they realized I was a pastor. They claimed that our church was defective (apostate) and that theirs was the true church. Have you had any pushy conversations like that at your door?

It felt alarming to think that such zealots are trolling my neighborhood. Actually, they were simply filling a void in the public space as good people have retreated more and more into private space. In fact, with all our modern innovations we don't even need to be home to answer the door. Great mobile applications like "Ring" let you see strangers at your door and shoo them away through your cell phone anywhere in the world. And of course, you don't need to go to the market any more since everything can be ordered online.

That's all fine, but are there not some negative consequences?

Though we may watch from afar, we leave the public spaces unattended physically, and of course others, possibly more divisive and sectarian voices, will fill the void. So it is important that we not give away the public spaces.

When I was ordained, I was especially motivated with the idea of leading deep Bible study and preaching lofty sermons. I dig that stuff. But I was also called to the legacy of John Wesley, who made a drastic shift in his life. Yes, he started out preaching lofty stuff as an 18th century Oxford don. But God called him beyond the church walls, to "be more vile" and preach in the open fields and market place. Then he organized those non-church people into a transformative movement that became Methodism. Wesley came to see the world as his parish.

Easter offers hope and a process for the future. When Jesus' followers looked for him in the tomb, they found it empty. He had risen. Sprung from the very private space of that

grave, the Jesus movement was unleashed on the public spaces of the world.

So we also need to rise with Jesus and leave the tomb. The church of Jesus Christ betrays her Savior and Lord when we hide behind the parish walls. Sage Granada Park United Methodist Church is more than a building. It is a center for God's mission to the homes, streets, parks and market places where our neighbors are.

Recently several of us have been going door to door to engage our neighbors. We have been inviting people to church, but more than that our purpose has been to reclaim the space for conversation. Using a survey, we have sought to discern the hopes and concerns of our neighbors. Response so far has been positive. I wish I could say that our church attendance will suddenly increase as a result of knocking on doors. Unfortunately, our modern culture is less than conducive to church going. One young family expressed enthusiasm about Jesus and Christianity, but less about going to church. They tried a lot of churches, but said that they couldn't relate to church-goers.

During the month of April there will be opportunities to venture outside the walls. On April 15 the youth will have a sports day at the Granada Park following worship. Members of the Next Gen group will be assisting and will follow with a picnic in the park. Sunday April 22 is Earth Day, so we will have our worship outdoors in the lawn area between the Sanctuary and the Fellowship Hall. Invite

your neighbors, and come, share in the resurrection of new life.



"A Way Forward"

The United Methodist
Commission on a Way Forward
met recently at El Segundo United
Methodist Church near LAX, as
part of its ongoing effort to come
up with solutions to a divisive
issue. The Commission was
established by the Council of
Bishops after the 2016 General
Conference found itself at an

impasse on LGBTQ inclusion.

We are part of a global denomination that has 56 annual conferences in the United States, including our own California-Pacific Annual Conference, and 75 annual conferences in Africa, Europe and the Philippines. While we all share a common heritage, core doctrines and polity, there are significantly different views on sexuality and other matters of biblical interpretation.

The Commission, made of 32 representatives from across the UMC, is tasked with researching solutions to these divisive issues. The March 22 meeting continued to dialogue about solutions. Eventually they will have to present a final report to the Council of Bishops at the April/ May meeting in Chicago. The bishops will have to decide which ideas should be received and acted by delegates to a Special Session of the General Conference February 23-26, 2019 in St. Louis, Missouri.

Ideas that have been floated include:

Retaining the existing Book of Discipline language and accountability that makes homosexuality "incompatible with Christian teaching" and lists officiating at a samegender union or being a "self-avowed practicing" gay clergy member as chargeable offenses under church law.

Removing such restrictive language from the Discipline and giving more

emphasis on local or regional contextualization. Rights would be extended to those who may have differing views on samegender weddings or the ordination LGBTQ people.

Create new branches, such as new annual or central conferences that would allow for differing views and practices of LGBTQ inclusion. These branches would still be united by shared doctrine and services and one Council of Bishops.

Let us keep the process and these fellow United Methodists in prayer.




