"The Empty Tomb and Pentecost Fire"

If you think about it, Christians have a lot of favorite numbersthe 40 days of Lent, the 12 disciples, the seven churches in Revelation, Jesus' three days in the tomb and the first day of the week. Actually we borrowed most of those numbers from our Jewish friends, like the 40 years that the children of Israel wandered in the wilderness after the exodus from Egypt. We even borrowed some of our festival days, like Pentecost, which is the Greek version of the Jewish festival of Shavuot. Pentecost literally means "fiftieth," being 50 days after Passover. For Christians, it's 50 days after Easter. This year it was coincidental that Easter and Passover occurred on the same weekend (except for Orthodox Christians, but that's another story). So we are in the middle of the season of Easter or the Great 50 Days, looking forward to the outpouring of the Spirit on Pentecost and the anniversary of the church's birth.

Easter was the celebration of the empty tomb, the victorious resurrection of Jesus over the forces of sin and death. But the empty tomb is not the end of the story. Christians see in the empty tomb of Easter an anticipation of God's gift of the Holy Spirit.

Indeed the empty tomb and the resurrection are prerequisite to Pentecost. In the gospel of John, Jesus said, "The one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father" (John 14:12). The work will be greater because the risen Lord will send the Holy Spirit, or the Advocate. "It is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you" (John 16:7).

This is a bit ironic, because we like to focus on Jesus, the great healer and sage. But Jesus said that he needed to leave and make way for the Holy Spirit so that his followers could more effectively live out the gospel. Indeed the early Christians came to identify themselves collectively as the body of Christ empowered by the Holy Spirit. And they continued to



spread phenomenally across human empires east and west.

Historically, churches have seen the period of the Great 50 Days as an extension of the formative practices of Lent. During Lent baptismal candidates were preparing to die and rise with Christ in the baptismal waters on Easter morning. Between Easter and Pentecost we should be considering what it means to be people who have been born again through those baptismal waters into the body of Christ. We are Easter People. By the grace of God we have been gathered from our diversity into the beloved community so that can live out the gospel.

Sage Granada Park UMC reflects that spread of the gospel. Like other Christians around the world we will celebrate the Pentecost and the birth of the church on Sunday, May 20. As a way of embodying the Spirit's unity in diversity, we will share our Pentecost Sunday worship with our Gujarati brothers and sisters in the Church of India with a combined worship service at 10:30 a.m. Like the first Pentecost, there will be different languages, but we will be unified by the languages of Christian love and music. The service will be followed by potluck dinner.

Don't be left out of Pentecost this year. Let's start counting down.





"Benny Tokusato" Rev. Dickson Kazuo Uagi

On returning from Japan, I visited my cousin, Benny Tokusato, in Los Angeles. He sold merchandise from vending carts on the sidewalk. He had a problem. Black kids would come in numbers to distract him while their buddies would steal his stuff out of sight.

His mother, a no-nonsense business woman, kept scolding him, "You must call the police. You know which kids are doing it. How can you support your family with these kids stealing from you all the time!" Benny said that calling the police would create a criminal record on the boys. That would likely push them toward gangs. And sooner of later, prison. Minority race, poverty, gangs, prison—a slippery slope. Benny concluded: "Mom, you must do things your way. I must do things my way. Those boys could grow up as solid citizens, but not if I call the police and report them."

Then came the Watts Riot. On the TV news, Korean storekeepers hiding on rooftops were ready with rifles and shotguns. They had fierce shootouts with angry, rioting blacks from the neighborhood. It was a miracle that nobody touched Benny's vendor carts—unbelievable! The boys knew that he knew they

were stealing from him daily. Through his eyes they could see the unprotected kindness of his heart. They knew he would never call the police on them—so naïve! The neighborhood boys had protected his carts in the midst of the riot!

I preached Benny's memorial service at Faith United Methodist Church in Gardena, CA, about 15 years ago. The church was full of expatriates from Waiakea Uka Camp 6, Sugar Plantation Camp in Hilo, Hawaii. Benny had lived there the first half of his life. I had lived below Camp 4. That must be the vision of Jesus-to nurture people like Benny for a future society. It is unnerving to run into them ahead of their time, already in our risky world, where we each protect ourselves. But then, maybe we are to nurture people

like Benny for a transformed society now being born communities of pure hearts!

Note: Shusako Endo, best seller Japanese Catholic author, wrote Wonderful Fool (Obakasan), 1959. Fyodor Dostoevsky, acclaimed Russian author, wrote The Idiot (1874, Movie 1958). We have all become too smart. Our minds like computers calculate our risk and advantage, polluting our souls. People cursed with less intelligence are naïve and uncalculating. The retain the sacred treasure of dogs—purity of heart. When we run into these "fools" and "idiots," our eyes are opened to our own ugly, self-seeking egos. Our hearts condemn us. Americans saw this so clearly in the movie, Forrest Gump (1994). Susako Endo and Fyodor Dostoevsky describe two such men in Japanese and Russian cultures. Surely Francis of Assisi was such a fool. My cousin, Benny, was another.


