

During Advent we think about Christ's first coming as a baby in Bethlehem, and also the promised second coming to fulfill God's peaceable kingdom. So our focus in this season is to make space in our lives, in our families and our world for the coming of Jesus, the chief and representative of all guests.

When I was a pastor in Baldwin Park some years ago we performed Las Posadas, in which church members acted out the story of Mary and Joseph, like a homeless family desperately looking for shelter. It is a wonderful musical dialogue. Our Nursery School performs a simplified Las Posadas in mid-December. It is a reminder not only to give shelter to Jesus, but also to show kindness to others who so desperately need some space to share.

Hospitality is a vital theme in Christian teaching. Jesus taught that whenever someone has done an act of kindness for "one of the least of these my kindred, you did it for me" (Matthew 25:40). The great 4<sup>th</sup> century bishop John Chrysostom urged his congregation to reserve a room in their homes for hospitality, "to which Christ may come" (Homily 45 on the Acts of the Apostles). During the Sundays of Advent, I will talk about the theme of making room for the special Guest God sends our way.

There are many ways we may enact Christian hospitality. In preparation for coming house guests, we clean house, spruce up the yard and set up Christmas decorations.

There are many other ways we can practice making room for Jesus. The Holiday Extravaganza takes place following worship on December 8, with performances by the kids under the direction of Ruth Chon. At the same time, you can get your Photo with Santa, and you can get your Omelet Brunch from Bill Yee. Come, invite family and friends, and share our space together.

On Saturday, December 14 we'll be Christmas caroling at Atherton Home, tentatively at 4 p.m., so we can share space with our elders. And if you're finished with your Christmas shopping, or need to drop the kids, we'll have a movie night on December 21 at 6 p.m. On Christmas Eve, we will join together to celebrate the birth of Christ. Through these and other means of grace, let us make ready for the coming of Jesus, the special Guest.

# What Are You Thankful For? How Culture Shapes Our **Thanks**

Do we still hold our first love of Christ? The longer we're Christians sometimes the more we might lose our gratitude to God and forget to count his blessings in our life. Since I've been exposed to different cultures, I have observed the ways people express thanks but still miss the essence of thankfulness: "Thanks, but no

thanks." Sometimes I want to skip certain cultural thanksgiving celebrations. This is because I have seen some people attend worship only during the special season, and afterward we don't see them until next year.

Let's ponder why we should be thankful, or what we are thankful for. Do we have to wait until this time of year to be thankful? In our Christian life, we also approach God when we are in need, such as when we get sick, are when awaiting a job interview or for our children to gain admission to a university; instead, we should recognize him every day.

One of the most dynamic qualities God longs for us to cultivate is that of a sincere heart of thankfulness. There are several reasons why we lose our gratitude to God. One is that we forget our roots—our family and where we came from. And then we forget to share these life stories to our children. Our children might then grow up seeing only prosperity with no thoughts about thanking God because they taken it for granted, or they don't understand God's story through their families. Our capacity to share our story of God's blessing is not just about the abundance of provision, wealth, or resources, but the capacity to recognize even the little things that we have.

David Bosch says, "Mission is essentially ecclesial: The missio dei is God's activity which both embraces the church and the world." Giving thanks to God is not merely the way to heaven; instead, it's our participation in his mission. Living in the culture of God and being thankful every day for his basic provision and protection is how we express our love to him. We neglect to give thanks because we have lost our first love and passion. Showing our thankful heart to one another is the simplest yet most powerful thing we can do for each other.

Therefore, we do not have to wait for Mother's Day, Father's Day, Friendship Day, or Thanksgiving Day. Paul says, "Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him" (Colossians 3:17).

We can achieve things not just because of our own abilities, but because of Christ. I haven't gone back home for a very long time. But I am thankful to the people around me who make me feel at home. As we come together with friends and family to enjoy food and solidarity, we take the day to offer thanks for God's provisions. As a community of God, we at Sage should be so thankful to God that he has allowed us to serve him voluntarily in our community. I am so thankful and blessed that at Sage I'm allowed to serve and receive with generosity. God called each one of us to create and cultivate a new culture of thankful hearts. Remarkably, he has chosen Sage to work for his glory and build his kingdom by serving.

# Thanksgiving Hope Meals

Every year, Sage Granada Park UMC assists the group, Catalyst SGV, by providing food items to students within the Alhambra Unified School District. Many students do not have access to stable meals when school is not in session during the weeklong Thanksgiving break. This year, we were able to deliver 122 breakfast and lunch meals to Monterey Highlands families. We also added an additional 26 bags for students at Mark Keppel and as-

# What will happen to our United Methodist Church?

Will the United Methodist Church remain United?

Last February a specially called General Conference in Missouri adopted the "Traditional Plan" which retains the position that the practice of homosexuality is "incompatible with Christian teaching," and that same sex marriage and the ordination of self-avowed practicing homosexuals is prohibited in the UMC. The General Conference is the top rule making body of our denomination.

The Traditional Plan also requires Annual Conferences to enforce this position. However, many within our Annual Conference and throughout the UMC disagree. There are already several gay and lesbian clergy in our Annual Conference, and many of our churches affirm same-sex weddings. They would like to change this position or leave the UMC. Note, however, that local Methodist congregations hold their church property in trust for the denomination. One cannot simply walk away with the property.

The next regular General Conference, in May 2020, will see several proposals in response to this discontent. - 1. The United States as a Regional Conference administrative subdivision puts U.S. churches in separate region from churches in Africa, Europe and Asia.
- 2. Bard-Jones Plan subdivides UMC into three ideological groups
- 3. Indianapolis Plan UMC retains current Traditional plan but allows Annual Conferences to opt for a new Centrist/ Progressive denomination or a Progressive denomination. Local

congregations may opt out of their Annual Conference decision.

- 4. UMC Next Plan denomination remains intact, but prohibitive language removed from Book of Discipline, while local churches will have options whether or not to allow same-sex weddings or homosexual ordination.
- New Expressions Worldwide (N.E.W.) Plan – UMC is dissolved and four new denominations formed along ideological lines.
- 6. Plain Grace Plan calls for a period of discernment through which various like -minded ecclesial groups would be allowed to emerge.
- 7. Oppose Dissolution | Preserve Unity Plan calls for further study to form new organization structure that maintains unity in mission while allowing the emergence of new contextual structures, some of which would be more inclusive of LGBTQ persons.

What do you think should happen to our denomination? What should our church do if our Annual Conference leaves the United Methodist Church? Are we entering a time chaos or are we entering a time of new adventure and mission opportunity?

The Dickens Holiday Carolers (DHC) started at Southern California Edison 25 years ago as a casual caroling group and has evolved into an independent group over the years. The group contains over a dozen singers from several churches and professional singing groups including Lake Avenue Church Sanctuary Choir, Verdugo Hills Women's Chorus, the Towne Singers of Pasadena, and the Pasadena Crown City Men's Chorus among others.

When they perform, they wear colorful Victorian era costumes and sing an average of 15-20 times during the Christmas Season. They can sing as a large ensemble (up to 15+) or in traditional quartets depending upon which member is available and what the client asks for. For the past several years, the group has been contracted by the cities of Monrovia and Glendora to sing Christmas Carols in their downtown core for the merchants and shoppers during the Christmas Season. They also perform at churches, private clubs, charity events, convents, Christmas

Tree lightings and many more. Their repertoire is just over 50 traditional carols and Christmas favorites.
