

"Moses and American politics"

"But Moses said to God, 'Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?'"
--Exodus 3:11

Moses in the Bible was a man of many ironies. The child born as a slave, was raised in a palace. The mother who gave him up was allowed to raise him. The prince of Egypt turned into a murderer and eventually turns into the great law-giver. The quiet shepherd became the national leader and liberator of slaves. The old man was a visionary prophet who didn't get to see the fulfillment of the vision. He is revered today by at least three major religions, and has been a guide to numerous political movements.

By the time you read these words, two political conventions have made their claims. Joe Biden was officially nominated as the Democratic candidate for U.S. President, and the incumbent, Donald Trump, is the Republican candidate. Under other political climates, this year might have been a good time to sit it out. After all, the Covid-19 virus has killed over 180,000 people in the U.S. alone, and so we're a little more nervous about doing anything public in nature.

In fact, a new national survey by the <u>Pew Research Center</u>, shows increased concerns over procedural difficulties in this year's election. For supporters of Trump, 35 percent are more concerned and for supporters of Biden, 60 percent are more concerned. That is up from 10 and 17 percent, respectively, in 2018. The survey also shows Trump supporters prefer voting in person and more Biden supporters prefer voting by mail.

Ironically, given these concerns, enthusiasm for voting is higher than it has been in 20 years. According to same survey, 83 percent of registered voters believe their vote "really matters," as opposed to 16 percent who think that it won't matter who gets elected. Back in the year 2000, those two trends were much closer – 50 percent said it really matters, and 44 percent said it didn't make any difference. That could actually be good news for our country. American voters are charged and ready to vote, assuming we are guided by wisdom and not misguided by something else.

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Could the biblical story of Moses offer us such wisdom for today's realities? What do you think? When Moses first stood before the elders of the Israelites in Egypt, they had to make a political choice, between him or Pharaoh. Note also that the ironies of Moses' life serve as a reminder that our lives and our politics are also full of ironies. The situation that looks like a disaster right now may, from a future perspective, be the critical turning point for a better future. The child of slaves becomes the one who saves the slaves through the sea. But such ironies don't happen automatically. Someone must be vigilant, open to the spark of divine grace in that moment, like the Egyptian princess who responded to the baby's cries in the reeds, and the shepherd who stopped at the burning bush.

Is your vote merely one in a million, or is it the one vote that will change the course of history?

During the next few weeks, we will be hearing from the lectionary readings in Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy. I won't tell you how to vote, but do consider how the story of Moses could be a spiritual guide to your political choices this year. Join us each Sunday at 10 a.m. on Zoom.

Our Mother Who Art in Heaven

Of course, **God** is **not** a **Father**. When we say Father, we mean a Human Father, not an Alligator Father, nor an Octopus Father. Alligators need an Alligator Father, and Octopuses need an Octopus Father, and we Humans need a Human Father as our God. Or we could not think or talk about God at all. Of course, God as God really is a thousand times more wonderful than a Human Father—a thousand times more wonderful than the human mind can think and human languages can express.

If God as Father is not really, really, true, what's wrong about **God as Mother**? The pain of God in the betrayal of Israelites worshipping Canaanite fertility deities is described as the **pain of childbirth**! (God as female). Truth be told, God Our Mother is just as good as God Our Father. Most world religions began as primitive religions in which men dominated in hunting, village raids, marital beatings, and occasional all-out tribal wars. In primitive sections of the Old Testament women were considered as mere personal property of men, no different than cattle, or sheep, or slaves. They were left out of earlier genealogies—The God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob (no women).

But as societies progressed, the worth of women became obvious to all. The amazing devotion to the elevated Virgin Mary as "Mother of God," *theotokos* in the Roman Catholic Church was strongly criticized by Protestants—Notre Dame (Our Lady), Our Lady of Guadalupe (1831), Our Lady of Lourdes (1858), the Immaculate Conception, the Virgin Birth, the Assumption of Mary (Nov. 1950), and the Sacred Heart of Mary. It is notable that criticism of Mary devotion has diminished or vanished with the Women Liberation Movement (Protestant and Catholic), where the elevation of Mary symbolized the elevation of all women.

In any case, it is not exceptional for Christian prayers in progressive communities to begin with, "God, our Father and our Mother." What do you think?

Grace empowers our freedom in Christ.

It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery. -- Galatians 5:1

August 15 is a remarkable day for several countries. On this day, many countries (India, South Korea, and Bahrain, etc.)

celebrate Independence Day, freedom from colonization. I remember my school, parents, and society taught me how we gained freedom from the British.

However, today, when I look around the world, I see millions of people still enslaved to bad things like human trafficking, but also to obsessions with social media, culture and even religion. They are not enjoying the ultimate freedom that they have. Why is this so? Have you ever thought about it? Although we talk about equality, human rights, freedom, and so on, why are people still in modern slavery? What causes it, and who can deliver them?

Although global Christianity repeatedly dialogues about freedom, we see many Christians living in some form of slavery and still do not benefit from the freedom which God award us. They may go to church from generation to generation, or they may do all types of activities in the church, yet they do not benefit from the intact package of freedom in Christ. Have you ever thought about what makes "Christians" lack enjoying freedom?

When we come across the Bible, we can witness that God's Grace is the foundation of our freedom, which has been part of God's redemptive purpose. In another way, displeasing God means saying that I am a Christian but paying no attention to his Grace and freedom that God offers. Rev. George's sermon preaches that Grace enables dedication to God to live in love, which produces a new kind of freedom. Therefore, understanding God's Grace liberates us from slavery, and living in the fullness of freedom is the foundation of being a Christian. In addition, saying that I am a Christian is not necessarily sufficient, but presenting the evidence of salvation and a personal encounter with Christ to society is vital.

Living in Grace and freedom is also an ingredient of our missional life that allows us to be the evidence of hope to the broken world. Therefore, every individual Christian's life is a missional life that convinces the world we are no longer slaves, but we are free by God's Grace. Until and unless we understand God's Grace, we fail to understand God's mission. Therefore, it's crucial to understand God's Grace and freedom; they are co-related to the mission of God that we carry every day.

I like the way Rev. George unpacks the "Grace Sermon" series. He effectively elaborates about God's prevenient Grace. We can't understand Gods' Grace if we have not experienced Jesus and being bonded with Christ. The Grace of God can only be understood through an authentic relationship with God that leads us to know that we are free, no longer slaves. The 66 books in the Bible indubitably elucidate God's mission story. It is all about "God's Grace and Freedom." Simply, Grace + Freedom = MIS-SION

In this season of Covid-19, what are you fearful of? Look around your home, family, church, workplace, and even at yourself. Think about how many individuals we know who are hampered or living in fear of habits, addictions, bad attitudes and the future. We do not have any superpowers and we are not efficient in offering Grace or freedom to people; however, we can exemplify God's Grace through God's love to help others experience Grace on their own.
