

COMMUNIST COMPLIMENT

Toshio Sato was a professor of Tokyo Union Seminary in the 1960's. Coming from Hawaii, I was the first American foreign student in a degree program in that seminary. During the war Toshio Sato was captured as a prisoner of war (POW) by U.S. forces in the Philippines. At Christmas time the U.S. troops gave all the POWs Japanese Bibles. Christmas world-wide is a time of celebration, hope, and joy. Some years later at an annual seminary Christmas party for all faculty and students, Sato described what it felt like to be a prisoner of war during Christmas. He was a defeated and humiliated prisoner of the lost cause of World War 2, while the whole world celebrated with Christmas jubilation. Toshio Sato later became President of Tokyo Union Theological Seminary, *Tokyō Shingaku Daigaku*, my alma mater.

Some years before that, Toshio Sato by chance happened upon a dear high school companion he had not seen in years. They talked over tea, about the massive tragedies coming upon them with losing the war. They discussed the foreboding collapse of the economy, the never-ending B-29 bombings, destruction of democracy, the politicalmilitary fascism, emperor worship, and the desperate foraging for food. His former high school classmate said as a concluding statement, "At least you Christians can pray!" His high school buddy had become a cardcarrying Communist. Communists are atheists. These were his parting words: "At least you Christians can pray."

Maybe it is only prisoners of war and cardcarrying Communists who really know what a privilege it is to be able to pray. What do you think?

The Signature of God

"The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands" (Psalm 19:1).

Is there a God? Our answer to this question is vivacious. Because this question is not yes or no, but how we discover the answer is substance. My sister-in-law is a professor and ceramic artist. She holds many art exhibitions locally and in

many different parts of the world. Sometimes she can easily say who the Artist is. I inquired how she could know; she told me there are certain things we can observe and discover in various arts. Understanding the piece of art, the way the artist makes it, the materials used, or the Artist's message conveyed to the public. Moreover, there must be an Artist's "Signature."

I remember my childhood; my father had to sign my grade reports for school. It was terrifying for me because I if he saw my lower grades he would react so critically. One time my grades were lower, and I was scared of talking to my dad. Instead I knew my older brother could copy my dad's signature well. With his support, I submitted my report to my headteacher and assumed no one knew. Later, I saw my father standing in my school office with the headteacher, because they found the signature wasn't my father's. The teacher told me they know my father's signature pattern. A few years ago, at one of the mission conferences in another country, I was interviewed by a TV channel; they asked me how I identify God's signature. I couldn't answer, but it disturbed me. I wondered "Are there any autographs of Jesus Christ?" One day I was spending time with God on a mountain, I saw the attributes of God. Psalm 19, "The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands" came to my mind. In that specific moment, the Holy Spirit convinced me that I hold a "divine signature" from God; he made me in his image. I am God's signature to the world.

God did not sign it with an idiosyncratic signature. It's not the same as how God speaks in his word. Still, God's signature illuminates his nature, redemptive purposes, and mission to the world through every individual who acknowledges and lives accordingly. We can be a copied signature like a Sunday-only Christian; but God's genuine, authentic signature is real to the world when we reflect His character in everyday life. Understanding who we are and our worthiness is an integral part of the Christian life. Many people say "I am nothing", "I can't do this," but that person actually has so much potential. Many parents compare their children to other children who perform differently or get better grades. But we need to help our children, church members, and friends comprehend their value; they are the signature of God. Our Christian life gravity is that we live as a person who shows God's sign. God's mission is all about understanding that you are the signature of God and inviting others to acknowledge that they are, too. We still can be a copy signature (imitating being a Christian like traditional church people do) by just going to church on Sundays, or we can live every day as the signature of God that expresses the Artist's identity by mirroring who God is to society. "The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands." What do we declare and proclaim by being God's signature?
