"And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him." – Mark 1:12-13

Have you seen our church's Lenten Devotional this year? Kris Taniguchi did another great job, and we had some exceptional submissions, many relating to struggles with the pandemic this past year. The adversities have brought out the best in us.

In the season of Lent we especially recognize our adversities and identify with our Lord Jesus in his struggles. The gospels say that he was tested by devil. Unlike Matthew and Luke, Mark's gospel gives only a bare outline. He went to the wilderness with the wild animals, the devil tested him and the angels ministered to him. In other words, he didn't go for treatment at a Dead Sea resort and spa.

But if it says the Spirit made him go to the wilderness, does that mean God led him into temptation. Don't we pray "lead us not into temptation"? The wilderness can be seen as a place of danger and testing, yes, but it is also the place of spiritual renewal. Like many earnest people of his time, Jesus retreated to the quiet places of life to renew his spirituality. So today we also value spiritual retreats to mountain or wilderness settings.

Recently, I had a two-hour quiet retreat on Zoom, in which I practiced spiritual disciplines, like centering prayer and *lectio divina*. Indeed, every spiritual retreat involves self-discipline spiritual practices.

During Lent we are enjoined to practice spiritual disciplines, even if it's nothing more than giving away a cup of cold water, or deciding to wake up earlier for prayer. These disciplines involve a change of habits, but being creatures of habit, change isn't easy. We like to have regular meals, and maybe a few snacks, and a little binge watching. Well, why not treat ourselves; but if adversity is the mother of invention, sometimes we need to forgo some things in order to sharpen up other parts of our life, just like physical exercise.

The gospels say that Jesus was in the wilderness and fasted 40 days. When I go without food just for a day the body starts to protest, and the enemy starts to play tricks on your brain. Why are you doing this, anyway? What's the point? You're not really going to make any difference. Don't worry. Be happy.

God in Jesus understands because Jesus was also tempted. Christians affirm that God was in Jesus – Emmanuel. But Christian theology also affirms the humanity of Jesus. He needed to prove his resolve, his character and fortitude, to carry out the mission of his life.

So, each one us, if we intend in any way to follow Jesus, must also practice our spiritual disciplines. We must also engage in practices that strengthen our resolve and our character. And we are going to face temptations and doubts along the way. It's natural, and will sometimes be difficult. James, the brother of Jesus exhorts, "My brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of any kind, consider it nothing but joy, because you know that the testing of your faith produces endurance; and let endurance have its full effect, so that you may be mature and complete, lacking in nothing" (James 1:2-4). As the apostle Paul reminded us, "No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it" (1 Corinthians 10:13).

So let us journey with Jesus this Lent. See where he takes you. And if you face temptation, remember that it's just part of the journey. God is with you.

I SHALL NOT WANT (23rd Psalm)

#1. Naomi Ogawa was a "picture bride." She got on a ship from Japan to California to marry a man she had never met. Clutching his photograph, she crossed the Pacific. She married the man, bearing him eight children in the poor farmland outside Sanger, some 35 miles east of Fresno. The daughter of a Methodist minister in Japan, she had enough theology coming out of her ears. But struggling to raise eight children in poverty, her religion was reduced to only one anchor of faith—"God will not let us starve!"

#2. My uncle lived a rich life, spreading fun and compassion through everybody he touched. He even coached a softball team in the giant Okinawan softball league in Honolulu. But in his elder years my uncle suffered from terminal cancer. He flew from Honolulu to Japan where some promised a cure through apricot pits. He phoned me in Fukuoka from Tokyo, saying, "I'm going to get well; I'm going to get well!"

Later in Honolulu, the doctors and nurses hated to enter his room—he was so angry. His wife finally scolded him saying, "Enough already!" "Just put everything into the hands of Odaisama." They were Shingon Buddhists trusting in their founder, Odaisama. Doctors and nurses were glad to enter his room now, where uncle rested in trusting peace. Lord is my shepherd, I refuse to die." This hard-headed obsession matured into "Odaisama is my shepherd, even if I die, bikutomo-shinai (I will fear no evil.)

According to your maturity, the 23rd Psalm can mean: Because the Lord is my shepherd, we will not starve to death. Because the Lord is my shepherd, I refuse to die. Because the Lord is my shepherd, I am not afraid to die.

And 7 shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever, 23rd Psalm, vs 6."
