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
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Strength in Weakness

"Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power."
Ephesians 6:10

Gymnasts are amazing. As a youngster my siblings and I were always scrambling up trees and rocks, and doing flips off the monkey bars. But the flips and spins of Olympic athletes are breathtaking. One of the current great gymnasts is U.S. gold-medalist, Simone Biles. At 24, she has probably accumulated the most world medals, having successfully performed in every gymnastic event.

What was maybe more breathtaking was when she dropped out of the competition earlier this week. Her decision came after losing her orientation in midair during vaulting and completing one and half twists instead of two and a half. Gymnastics, like many other sports, rely as much on mental as on the physical state of being. In an ESPN report she said that you have to "be there" 100 percent. "If not, you get hurt," she said. Teammates have accepted her decision, recognizing that she is more than just her accomplishments.

This reminds me of grace. Scripture calls us to be "strong in the Lord and in the strength of God's power." The clause can be misleading. You might just hear the first phrase, "be strong" and the last word, "power." Yes, be strong! Be powerful! That's what we look up to in our society, superheroes who single-handedly vanquish the bad buys.

But this isn't about brute force. A parallel expression is to "be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus" (2 Timothy 2:1). To be thus strong is to practice relying on that divine energy that draws us into God's orbit. "But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift" (Eph. 4:7). We gain strength of character as we gradually submit to God's greater strength.

The literary context is the "household code," a typical part of ancient Greek letters instructing moral responsibility to family members, so that they will be fitting members of the larger "polis," the city state. In the Ephesians

letter, the larger polis is God's household. In God's household, power structures are leveled and reversed. "Be subject to one another out of reverence for Christ" (Eph. 5:21). Even those who are masters of their households are co-subordinate with their own slaves under God's rule, because they have "the same master in heaven" (Eph. 6:9).

So, this strength is, first of all, not just individual brute strength, but strength that is focused for the family of Christ. Being strong in the Lord, or being strong in grace, is to have a shared strength. Though one person in the team may be weak for the moment, other members of the team pick up the slack and continue the pace. For example, when Simone Biles stepped out, other members of the USA team, such as Sunisa Lee went on to win gold.

Second, being strong in grace, is to be a channel for divine strength to flow through us. Rather than forced brute strength, which can cause injuries, you become so attuned to the relationship between your body and the environment, to others and to God, that movement seems effortless. It is divine grace working through us.

Just as athletes and musicians must engage in regular practice to be at top form, disciples must practice being strong in the Lord. The objective is not power over, but power with, to be so at one with one's craft, physically, mentally and spiritually, that it flows naturally.

For Christians, some of the most important exercises, or means of grace, include daily prayer, scripture reading, worship, good conversation, acts of mercy and acts of justice. Like the gymnasts and other athletes who practice being physically and mentally present, let us also practice being strong in the Lord, so that our Christian service and discipleship will eventually flow effortlessly for the transformation of our world.

The Gift

Ephesians 2:8-9 says, "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God not by works so that no one can boast," and Romans 6:23 says, "The wage of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Gifts, who does not like gifts! Hmmm... We may not like all gifts, though, because some may have expectations of the gifts they want to grasp, and also we may underestimate or devalue free gifts. We may also hear that a free gift is too good to be true and that there must be something we have to do to ensure we attain this gift.

Marcel Mauss' classic, well-written book, The Gift, expresses a theory of gift exchange. The book raised many thought-provoking questions when I read it. For Mauss, there are no free gifts. According to his observations, analyses, and discoveries, "gifts are inescapable" in every single human culture. Mauss' observations of cultures like the Polynesian, Melanesian, Northwest Native American , and Asian contexts, led him to argue that gift-giving and receiving necessitated obligatory reciprocity or squaring. Mauss raises many questions for the readers to think about gifts that we receive and give to someone. From this standpoint, we need to ponder what influence dwells in the object that triggers its recipient to pay it back. Is it the gift itself, the attitude, or the social-cultural obligation?

As humans, we all have experienced some sort of gift-exchange. Even though the sizes, characters, and values vary, we all still like receiving gifts that feel good. I also want to note that the "gift" is so much more distinctive than the structure of "barter" (You give me that, then I will give you this) and "commodity" (which is market-based and founded less on relationship). One of the Bible's greatest truths and questions that people often ask is that God offers us our salvation as a free gift. Is it truly free? It isn't something we can buy, nor is it something we can earn by our good works, but is it free? The Bible unquestionably communicates to us the two characteristics of God's free gift called "Salvation." First, it tells us that it is a costly gift; Jesus paid it on the cross (John 3:16).

Secondly, like any other gift, God's gift of salvation does not become ours until we accept it, or devalue it as cheap. We keep many "cheap" gifts on the side or put them in the trash instead of understanding the value of a person's love, respect, and attitude. Suppose we do not understand the value and the love of a free gift and that we are obligated to live by the way of salvation and grace. The Church turns into a religious building, the Bible turns into a storybook, and Jesus becomes an idol of Christmas.

Yes, salvation is generously offered to us by God's amazing love and grace but at an immense price for Him! Our individual, "reciprocal" response through obedience by accepting the total call of salvation to save the world conveys that we love God and are thankful for His gift.
