

E-Thymes October 2022 "Saints, Heroes and Anti-Heroes"

"[God] has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light." – Colossians 1:12b

"Anti-Hero" is the latest from pop singer, Taylor Swift. According to <u>TODAY online</u>, she describes the song as a "guided tour" of the nightmares of her insecurities: "When my depression works the graveyard shift/ All of the people I've ghosted stand there in the room." Though she has become a hero and role model for many, Swift sees herself as having become "unmanageably sized."

We are in the age of the anti-hero. An anti-hero is usually defined as a main character in a narrative who is lacking in conventional heroic characteristics. Many of our favorite pop heroes and superheroes often have a soft or unsavory underside. Spider-Man acts like a superhero, but masked or not, Peter Parker is this shy nerd driven by grief, regret and self-doubt. Batman is the Dark Knight. Even some villains are found to be fallen or potential heroes. "Wicked," the musical, offers the sad backstory of Elphaba, the Wicked Witch of the West, and the one we most love to hate, Darth Vader, finds a kind of redemption in the end.

In my thinking, nurses are right up there with everyday heroes, until a couple weeks ago when I landed in the hospital with another bout of anemia. One of the nurses helping me was surely going through anger issues. You do not want an agitated nurse trying to insert an intravenous line in your arm. Ouch! Fortunately, the next two nurses exhibited balanced measures of compassion and competency, but they were clearly stressed. One shared that though she had been working in that hospital for 10 years, she was looking forward to marriage and a work-at-

home job. A third nurse said that she was working a second job as a hospice nurse to make ends meet. She was frustrated because there was such a staff shortage that she often couldn't adequately tend to patients, and had a hard time getting supplies. How did she deal with the stress? Hiking, whenever she had the chance.

Saints are kind of like heroes. A saint is often defined as one known for piety, virtue or other exemplary traits. In the Roman Catholic tradition, official saints are those deceased persons who have demonstrated a heroic level of virtue. But even St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Theresa) revealed in her published journal that she long struggled with doubt. So is she an anti-saint?

But actually, all who call on the Lord are saints-in-the-making. The apostle Paul often addressed as "saints" those members of the churches to whom he wrote, even those who were clearly imperfect. Saints are more like anti-heroes. Jeffrey Overstreet, in the <u>Seattle Pacific University Response</u> magazine quotes ethicist Samuel Wells as saying that hero stories "are told to laud the virtues of the heroes — for if the hero failed, all would be lost. By contrast, a saint can fail in a way that the hero can't, because the failure of the saint reveals the forgiveness and the new possibilities made in God, and the saint is just a small character in a story that's always fundamentally about God."

Thanks be to God, by whose grace you and I are saints-in-the-making. Though we may fail today or tomorrow, we are still reflections of God's epic love.

Peacemakers


A former Christian missionary to Central America spoke fervently against the dictators, police and gangs harassing the poor so intensely that many had to leave on long, dangerous treks to the U.S. southern border.

This was a mini-conference in Los Angeles on Buddhist-Christian activism. Her counterpart Vietnamese Buddhist monk sent me an email the next week. He was most concerned that her intense anger might cause herself harm. She was my good friend.

She fell dead in a few weeks. Vietnamese monk, Thich Nhat Hanh, wrote famously that those who fight for peace **must first have peace themselves** in their hearts. Nhat Hanh's writings greatly honors Jesus Christ.

<u>HOPE Meal Kits:</u> The HOPE meal kits are easily accessible, shelf-safe packaged foods for students that are in unstable housing or are unhoused. This provides food for these students when school meals are not available during the Thanksgiving break. We are asking that you provide breakfast, lunch, and snack items in a large reusable or plastic grocery bag. We are also requesting a \$10 gift card to a local fast food restaurant for each student. Each student will receive one HOPE meal bag and one \$10 gift card. Please don't put the gift card in the bag. They will be handed to the student (or parent) separately so that it does not get lost in storage or during transport. Rev. George has committed 25 from our church. These HOPE meal kits will be going to Bella Vista Elementary School in Monterey Park. Delivery will be made on 11/14 or 11/15 to the school so that they have enough time to distribute to the students that need them before Thanksgiving break. The kits and gift cards can be dropped off at the church office Tue-Fri, 9:30-2:30.
