"Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month"



"All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." – Acts 2:4

If you've gotten out of your house in the past few weeks, or you've driven past open hillsides, then your eyes have probably been bombarded by the brilliance of the poppies, wild lilac, mustard, sage and other wildflowers flourishing from the abundant rains. Our own wildflower garden, planted by the Morrisons, is also spreading, with flowers blooming in the raised bedding along with the milkweed planted by Ryan Wong. It's so wonderful to see the diversity of colors and species. In the same way, it is so wonderful to experience the diversity of people that make up our region and our church.

May is Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month. May was originally chosen because of two important dates. On May 7, 1843, the first Japanese immigrant, a 14-year-old fisherman by the name of Manjiro, arrived in the United States, after being shipwrecked and then adopted by the American ship's captain who rescued him (History Channel). Then on May 10 in 1869, Americans celebrated the golden spike being driven into the first transcontinental railroad. That could not have happened without the backbreaking labor of Chinese immigrants.

Of course, that reflects only some of the Asian ethnicities who have helped to make America what it is today, not to mention the Asia Pacific Islander communities. California Pacific Annual Conference includes people from across the Pacific, including Tonga, Samoa, Saipan, as well as Hawaii. Our own church is a microcosm of ethnic diversity. Sage Granada Park UMC was created 25 years ago, in May 1998, as a merger of Sage UMC, a historic Japanese American congregation, and Granada Park UMC. Our diversity now includes families with ancestry from Japan, China, Korea, India, Southeast Asian nations, Hawaii and other Pacific Islands, as well those who trace from Europe and Latin America.

Joined together as a faith community, we may certainly enjoy each other's diverse stories and contributions. I have certainly valued the stories of how Japanese American families struggled during World War II to maintain their identity and pride in spite of the incarcerations resulting from Executive Order 9066. And so we should hear each other's stories and cherish the diversity of our identities.

But we are a church called into being by the same Holy Spirit who fell upon the apostles on that Pentecost so long ago. That means that we have a purpose that both includes and transcends our diversity. In the Acts 2 story of the first Pentecost, the Spirit didn't come just so they could have a nice big church in Jerusalem. They were called to mission, to transform the world according to the vision of God's eternal reign. Eventually, they were scattered abroad to the linguistic diversity of the Jewish diaspora and eventually to the linguistic and ethnic diversity of the whole world.

So also we in our diversity must also be looking outward. That is what our Communion prayer proclaims: "Eternal God, we give you thanks for this holy mystery in which you have given yourself to us. Grant that we may go into the world in the strength of your Spirit, to give ourselves for others."

Faith communities, like Sage Granada Park, which are learning to live and work together in diversity are also being equipped by the Spirit to minister in a world of diversity. We live in a world of need, hungering for spiritual food, hungering for food to fill their stomachs. So let us follow the Spirit to address bringing spiritual and physical food to the world.

Many things celebrate in May – JA Awareness, UM Heritage month, Mother's Day.

We may very well celebrate our diverse heritages.

The Miracle of the Resurrection

The early church believed in the Easter Resurrection as a dead body coming back to life, blood circulating, lungs breathing, body temperature warming, then rising into heaven to the Right Hand of God. A Physical Miracle.

In the pre-scientific world view, religions proved their religious truth by physical miracles. Theravada Buddhism has virgin birth stories for Gautama Buddha. Islam teaches that Muhammed rode a miracle horse through the sky from Mecca to Jerusalem, visiting Heaven on the way, in one night. (ISRA & MIRAJ) In today's scientific world it is the Apostle Paul's view of a spiritual resurrection (New Testament Romans, etc.) that inspires most Christians. The Resurrection for Paul is mainly a spiritual Jesus rising to live in the hearts of all Christians. Elsewhere

Paul confirms the bodily resurrection. But in his writing of Christian living, he speaks only of the Spirit of Christ (Cosmic Christ) which fits well in today's view of science. Today Christians have this choice of Physical or Spiritual Resurrection—or both. No problem.


